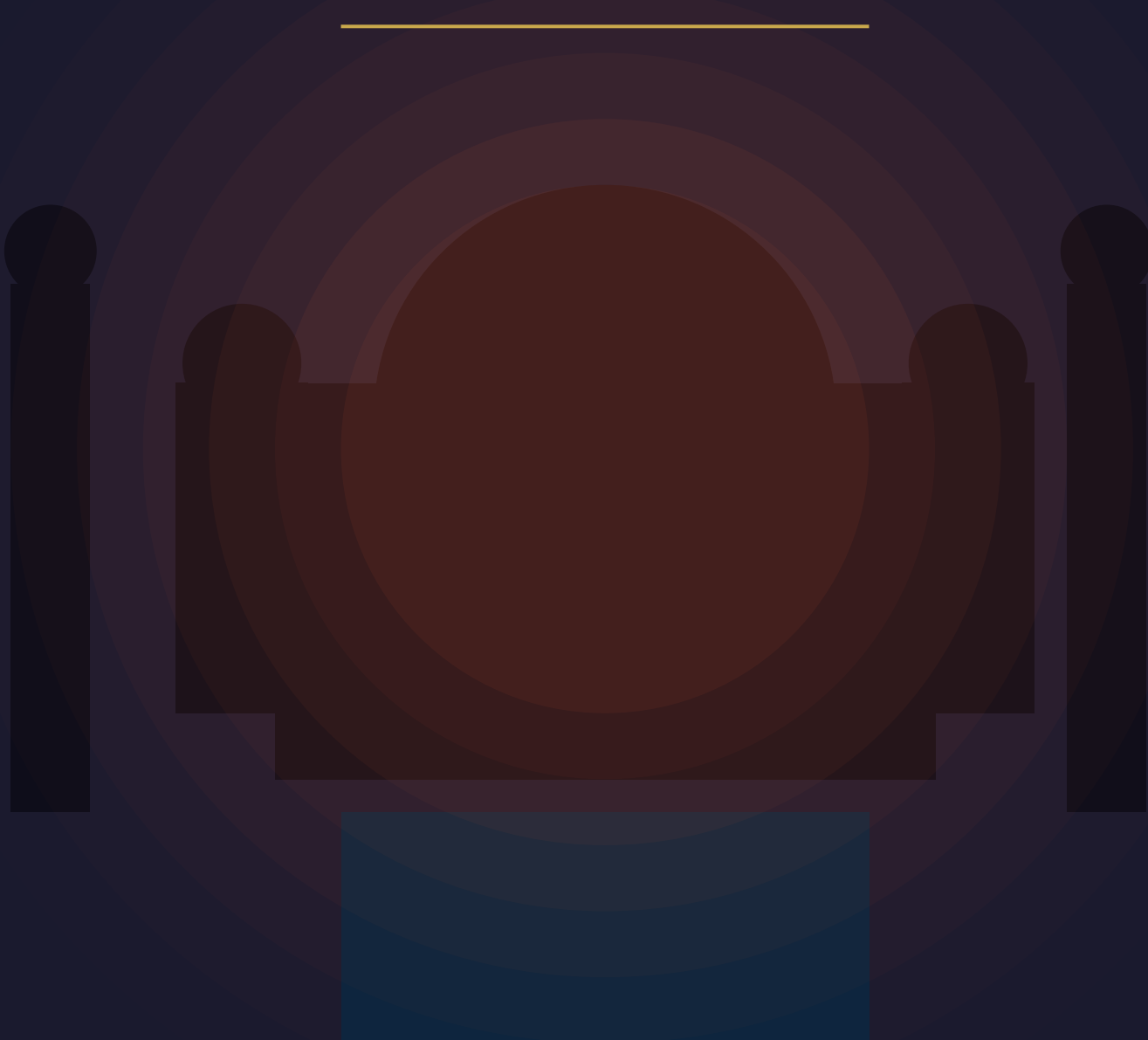

01 Essential Facts

About the Taj Mahal

Built by	Emperor Shah Jahan, in memory of his wife Mumtaz Mahal
Constructed	1632 – 1653 AD (over 20 years)
Architects	Ustad Ahmad Lahauri (chief architect) + 20,000 artisans
Material	White Makrana marble from Rajasthan + 28 precious stones
UNESCO	World Heritage Site since 1983
Location	Agra, Uttar Pradesh, India (river Yamuna bank)
Meaning	"Crown of the Palace" — a symbol of eternal love
Visitors/year	7–8 million tourists annually

◆ INSIDER TIP

The marble changes colour throughout the day — pinkish at sunrise, brilliant white at noon, and golden under moonlight. Sunrise gives you the most magical transformation.

02 Why Sunrise?

The Best Time to Experience the Taj Mahal

Of all the times to visit the Taj Mahal, sunrise is — without question — the most spectacular. Here is why I always recommend my guests arrive at dawn:

■ **Golden Light**

The first rays of sun turn the white marble into liquid gold and soft pink. No filter needed for your photos.

■ **Fewer Crowds**

Fewer than 500 people at opening vs. 20,000+ by midday. You can stand directly in front of the Taj — alone.

■■ **Cooler Temperature**

Agra can reach 45°C in summer. Sunrise is 15–20°C cooler and far more comfortable for walking.

■ **Best Photography**

Soft, diffused light is every photographer's dream. No harsh shadows. Perfect reflections in the pool.

■■ **Peaceful Atmosphere**

The serenity of dawn adds a spiritual quality to the experience. You can hear the birds, feel the history.

■ **Worth Every Rupee**

Your entry ticket is valid for the whole day, so you can return later if you wish — but sunrise never disappoints.

03 Tickets, Entry & Timings

Everything You Need to Know Before You Arrive

Opening Hours

Open	Sunrise to Sunset (approx. 06:00 – 18:30)
Closed on	Every Friday (mosque prayers)
Sunrise Tour	Special entry from 30 minutes before official sunrise
Last Entry	45 minutes before sunset

Ticket Prices (2024–25)

Foreign Tourists	■1,300 (includes ASI charge + Agra Development Levy)
SAARC/BIMSTEC Nations	■740 (Bangladesh, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Nepal, etc.)
Indian Citizens	■50
Children (under 15)	FREE
Mausoleum Entry	+■200 extra for all visitors (to enter the main tomb)

◆ BOOKING TIP

Always buy tickets in advance online at asi.payumoney.com or through your licensed guide. On-the-spot queues can take 1–2 hours during peak season (Oct–Mar).

The Sunrise Special ticket (limited slots) must be booked at least 24 hours in advance and sells out fast. Your guide can arrange this for you.

04 How to Reach the Taj Mahal

Getting There Smoothly

From Delhi (most common route)

By Train	Gatimaan Express (fastest, 1h 40m) or Shatabdi from New Delhi station. Book at IRCTC.co.in — book 3–4 weeks ahead.
By Car/Driver	3–4 hours via Yamuna Expressway. Most convenient for families. Hire a trusted driver through your guide service.
By Bus	ISBT Kashmere Gate (AC Volvo, ~3.5 hrs). Budget option.

Reaching the Main Gate from Agra City

E-rickshaw	Most eco-friendly; last 500m zone is vehicle-free.
Camel Cart	A fun, traditional option — but allow extra time.
On Foot	If staying nearby (Taj Ganj area), 10-minute walk.
Auto-rickshaw	Available outside the vehicle-free zone.

◆ INSIDER TIP

For sunrise, aim to reach the South Gate (main gate) by **5:30 AM**. Your guide will arrange pick-up from your hotel to ensure you are never late. The magic happens in the first 20 minutes after sunrise.

05 What to Wear & Bring

Dress Smart, Visit Comfortably

Dress Code

The Taj Mahal is an active place of worship. While there is no strict dress code for tourists, modest clothing is respectful and recommended:

- ✓ Shoulders and knees covered (especially when entering the mosque area)
- ✓ Comfortable walking shoes — you will remove them before the mausoleum
- ✓ Avoid bright white (you will blend into the marble in photos!)
- ✓ Loose, breathable fabrics — especially in summer (Apr–Jun)
- ✓ A light scarf or shawl (useful for sun, and respectful inside)

What to Bring

- ✓ Printed/digital tickets (mandatory — no entry without ticket)
- ✓ Valid passport or ID (required at entry)
- ✓ Camera or phone fully charged — you WILL take 100+ photos
- ✓ Water bottle (small, sealed — large bags not allowed)
- ✓ Sunscreen and sunglasses (even at sunrise, the glare is strong)
- ✓ Small amount of cash (₹200–500) for shoe storage, tips
- ✓ Hand sanitizer (shoe removal area can be crowded)

◆ IMPORTANT

Not Allowed Inside: Tripods, selfie sticks, food, tobacco, alcohol, large backpacks (above cabin baggage size). Security is strict. Leave these at your hotel.

06 Top Photography Spots

Capture the Taj Like a Pro

Spot 1: The Reflecting Pool (Hauz-i-Kausar)

The classic shot. Position yourself at the far end of the pool on the central pathway. At sunrise, the reflection is mirror-perfect. Arrive first — this spot fills up within minutes.

Spot 2: Princess Diana Bench

The iconic bench where Princess Diana sat alone in 1992. Located to the right of the reflecting pool. Queue early — it is extremely popular with all visitors.

Spot 3: Inside the Great Gate Arch (Darwaza-i-Rauza)

Frame the Taj perfectly through the red sandstone archway. This gives you a "picture within a picture" — one of the most beautiful compositions possible.

Spot 4: The Yamuna River Viewpoint

Walk behind the Taj Mahal (east side) to the Yamuna riverbank. Very few tourists know this spot — you will have it almost to yourself. Stunning backside view.

Spot 5: The Mosque Courtyard

From inside the mosque to the left of the main mausoleum, you get a unique diagonal angle with beautiful foreground architecture.

Spot 6: Mehtab Bagh (Moonlight Garden)

Located directly across the Yamuna river. This gives you a wider, full-frontal view — ideal for landscape photographers. A short ride from the main complex.

07 Insider Secrets

What Nobody Tells You About the Taj Mahal

❖ **The Taj is perfectly symmetrical — except one thing**

Shah Jahan's cenotaph was added after his death by his son Aurangzeb. It breaks the otherwise flawless symmetry. Look for it inside the mausoleum.

❖ **The minarets lean slightly outward — on purpose**

The four minarets are built at a slight outward angle. If they ever fell due to an earthquake, they would fall away from the main tomb, not onto it. Engineering genius.

❖ **The calligraphy is an optical illusion**

The Quranic verses inscribed on the main arch appear to be the same size from top to bottom. In reality, the upper letters are larger — designed to look uniform from ground level. Master illusionists at work.

❖ **22 years, 22 smaller domes**

The Taj took 22 years to build. There are exactly 22 smaller domes around the main structure — one for each year of construction.

❖ **The Taj changes colour 3 times a day**

Pinkish and golden at sunrise, dazzling white at noon, and glowing in warm tones at sunset. On full moon nights, the Taj appears almost silver. There are special night viewing tickets for full moon evenings.

❖ **No two marble inlays are the same**

The 28 types of precious and semi-precious stones inlaid into the marble are sourced from across Asia and beyond — lapis from Afghanistan, jade from China, carnelian from Arabia. Each floral motif is unique.

08 Scams & Safety

Stay Smart, Stay Safe

Agra is wonderful, but like any major tourist destination, there are people who try to take advantage of first-time visitors. Here is what to watch out for:

■ Fake Ticket Sellers

NEVER buy tickets from anyone outside the gate. Official counters and online booking only. Fake tickets are common.

■ "Closed Today" Trick

Touts tell you "The Taj is closed today" and redirect you to a shop or alternative. The Taj only closes on Fridays. Ignore these people.

■ Unofficial Guides

Unlicensed guides will approach you at the gate offering cheap tours. They give wrong information and often lead you to commission-based shops. Always hire a Government Licensed Guide (they carry an official ID card).

■ Marble Souvenir Scam

"Taj Mahal marble" souvenirs sold near the gate are almost always fake alabaster or plastic. For genuine marble inlay work, visit a government-authorized craft shop.

■ Overpriced Rickshaws

Agree on a price BEFORE getting in any auto/e-rickshaw. The standard rate from Taj Ganj to the gate is ■30–50. Don't pay ■300+.

■ Aggressive Photography

Some people around the site charge you money after taking your photo 'for free'. Decline politely or walk away before they can demand payment.

◆ KAMRAN'S ADVICE

The single best way to avoid ALL of the above: **book a private licensed guide** from home before you arrive. Your guide handles tickets, transport, and protects you from touts the entire day.

09 After the Taj

Best Things to Do in Agra

■ Agra Fort (Red Fort)

A UNESCO World Heritage Site — 2.5 km from the Taj. Shah Jahan was imprisoned here by his son and could see the Taj from his tower window. Allow 2 hours.

■ Fatehpur Sikri

Akbar's abandoned Mughal capital, 40 km from Agra. A ghost city frozen in time. Best visited in the afternoon after your sunrise Taj experience.

■ Mehtab Bagh

The Moonlight Garden — directly across the Yamuna. Visit at sunset for the best rear view of the Taj glowing in orange light. Almost no crowds.

■ Agra's Petha & Street Food

Agra is famous for Petha (white pumpkin sweet). Try it at Panchi Petha near Sadar Bazaar. Also try bedai (fried bread with sabzi) for a local breakfast.

■ Kinari Bazaar

The old market of Agra — marble inlay work, zari embroidery, leather goods. Great for authentic handicraft shopping. Bargain politely!

10 Packing Checklist

- ✓ Valid ID / Passport
 - ✓ Taj Mahal ticket (printed or digital)
 - ✓ Fully charged camera / phone
 - ✓ Comfortable walking shoes (slip-on preferred)
 - ✓ Light scarf or shawl
 - ✓ Sunscreen, sunglasses
 - ✓ Small water bottle
 - ✓ ■300–500 cash (small denominations)
 - ✓ Hand sanitizer
 - ✓ Light breakfast (eat before arriving)
